Celebrating Easter is celebrating new life: it's everywhere in the blossom, buds, newly feathered hens, quick flitting blue tits, and our elderly

cat, Ebony, chased at top speed by the neighbouring Tabby.

New life is also to be found at Spring Harvest 2024 when St John's go, with thousands of people, to Butlin's, Minehead (again!), as the Apostle Paul writes to the Ephesians, to 'Live... lives, full in the fullness of God'. Last year we celebrated Easter singing 'Great are you Lord' with huge balloons gently bouncing over our heads.



Looking to the future new life at St John's, we will be moving towards the time when a new Incumbent-to-be will become part of our church family. We hope and pray that many will come forward for interview, and that this time, for all who apply, will be joyous and exciting as they consider next steps with God.



The new life we see in nature, in wildlife, and in the people around us, strengthens our faith. Jesus among us, **alive**, and giving us the sure and certain hope of eternal life with him. But for many, discovering new life does not come easily. Often new life is discovered in places of

hardship, suffering, and persecution when nothing is left to hold on to but Jesus. It's here that a depth of faith opens up new life as the love of Jesus floods in. Pastor Lorzeno is in prison at this moment in Cuba and will be so for another six years. His faith comes from this unexpected place of joylessness and true hardship. Yet, his faith sustains us in seeing him with both feet firmly planted on love. He enables us to take in, with all followers of Jesus living in similar places, the extravagant dimensions of Christ's love. These forget-me-nots are from my garden and a reminder of his new life. Let's **forget-Pastor Lorenzo and others-not** as we celebrate with them the new life of Jesus: Jesus is Risen!



You may like to pray this prayer from Ephesians 3:14-21:



My response is to get down on my knees before the Father, this magnificent Father who parcels out all heaven and earth. I ask him to strengthen you by his Spirit - not a brute strength but a glorious inner strength - that Christ will live in you as you open the door and invite him in. And I ask him that with both feet planted firmly on love, you'll be able to take in with all followers of Jesus the extravagant dimensions of Christ's love. Reach out and experience the breadth! Test the length! Plumb the depths! Rise to the heights! Live full lives, full in the fullness of God.

God can do anything, you know - far more than you could ever imagine or guess or request in your wildest dreams! He does it not by pushing us around but by working within us, his Spirit deeply and gently within us.

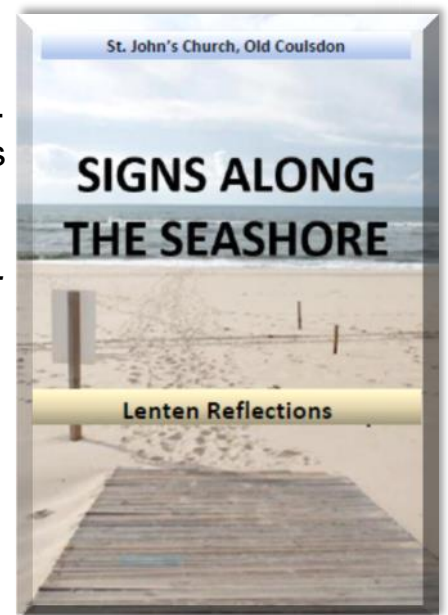
FANCY THAT 'BREATH of FRESH AIR'?

'DIY The Repair Shop'

The much loved model of the Easter Garden is over 60 years old. Built by Derek Bass, the plaster work was getting very dry and crumbling. The paint had faded and the three figures had lost their toes where children had 'walked' them up the path to the tomb. Derek had put so much thought and preparation in his work. He had sketched the idea first, then built a scale model which his family found in his loft after he died.

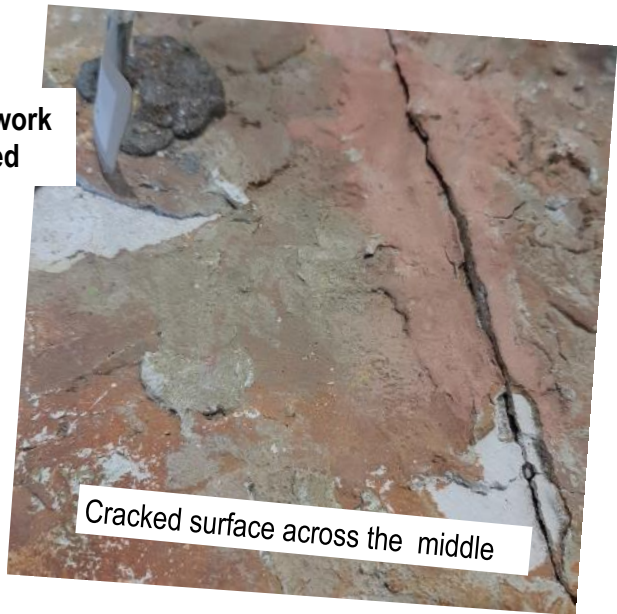


After some discussion, in May 2023, I applied to the BBC programme 'The Repair Shop' but in February 2024 with no contact from them and Lent looming we decided to try to mend it ourselves. I had contacted Derek's son to keep him posted and he had said that he was happy if we, 'do anything'. Three people expressed an interest so we met up to discuss what was needed.

With glue, plaster of Paris, modelling plaster and some decorators caulk, we slowly secured and stabilized the structure repairing/replacing the feet and hands of some of the figures.

The walls around the garden had some woodworm and so they went off to someone the scout leaders knew who replaced the woodwork.

Then came the painting and additional ideas of gluing gravel paths and some small stones. We had an illustrated book about life in Jesus time that we could reference to get an accurate idea of colours.

It has been such an enjoyable project. We met up four or five times working for about 2 hours each time. We prayed and got to know each other better, with each person having valuable input. Now another person has offered to get the plants for the wall, which is truly wonderful.



We have all been blessed by this project and pray the rejuvenated model will bless others as it illustrates the story of Holy Week and Easter Day.

Daffodils



What does this word mean to you? Is your head immediately filled with bright yellow, thoughts of spring and lines from Wordsworth's poem?

'I wandered, lonely as a cloud,
That floats on high, o'er vale and hill,
When all at once I saw a crowd, a host of
golden daffodils.....'

As a young person at High School I was very shy and an introvert, always sitting quietly near the back, avoiding attention. I'm from a line of redheads with the accompanying fair skin and freckles that blushes really easily. Teasing for this abounded, which only made my shyness more extreme. My teachers, in their wisdom, thought it would 'help' me to take the English Speaking Board exams which involved giving a talk, reciting a poem by heart and reading aloud from a book, all to an audience. As you can imagine this was a nightmare for me and I developed a terror of my English classes. As you may have already guessed, the poem I had to learn was indeed 'Daffodils' by William Wordsworth.

However I absolutely love daffodils. As soon as they start peeping up through the soil I'm filled with joy at spring arriving. They greet me when I leave my house and when I return, when I arrive at our beautiful church and all places in between. They fill the supermarkets with bunches of tight buds just waiting to unfurl in the warmth of our homes.

I was at Emmetts National Trust garden this week. Watching a raft of golden daffodils swaying in the breeze I was reminded of our lovely church children and what makes them so special. They are just like the promise of these daffodils in early Spring, from the first tiny green shoots to the spectacular bursting forth of their

beautiful golden flowers. Everything is there in that bulb waiting to be awakened. Just like the daffodils, our children need sunlight, water and nourishment to grow. And just as we continue to grow and strengthen in our faith, so our children's fragile petals will unfurl and grow too. As we nurture them and they absorb the water and bread of life so will their roots grow, their stems will stand tall and their faces will turn upwards towards the sun. The cold wind may blow, they may bend and falter but, rooted in their faith, they will always have the strength within them to withstand the storm.



Our church is one family, its children belong to us all, how lovely that we can all play a part in sharing our faith with the next generation.

So, we gave our new bell ropes their debut this morning after Patrick and I replaced them on Friday. Gone are the red, white and blue stripes, and in with a lovely deep purple! Hopefully we’ll get another 12-13 years out of these. 😊

How sad that the bells are hardly being rung at all at the moment—and so many say how much they miss hearing them on Sunday mornings. When the Surrey Ringers came Martin handed out the following note and left some in church:

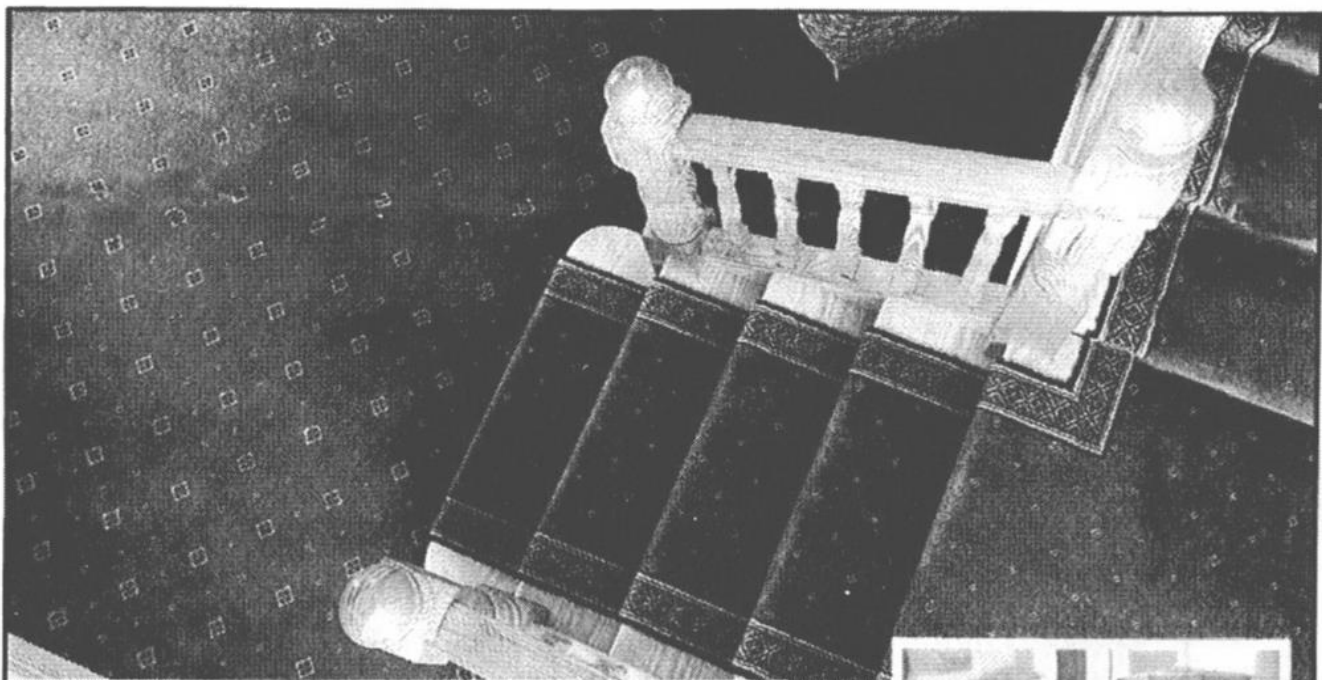
