April 2026

As many of you know, we used to live in the Middle East. One of my friends had grown up in a Muslim family. We became friends and started reading the Bible together, working our way from the Old Testament through to the birth of Jesus.

One night he has a dream. In the dream he sees some women carrying some spices to a tomb. They are met by angels who say that Jesus isn't dead but alive. He wakes up in a cold sweat and does what you do with something you

don't know - he Googles the bits of his dream. Up pops the story of Luke 24 which he reads. He can't believe his eyes. He had dreamt exactly what is in the Bible despite having never read it - the true story of what happened on Easter Sunday.



I would love to encourage you to look at the stories of Easter with fresh eyes this April. Enjoy the wonder of Easter. Why did Jesus appear to women first when they were so untrusted in courts in Roman times? Why were the only thing of value, the grave clothes not taken? How did

the disciples turn from being so frightened to being bold and willing to die for their belief that Jesus had literally risen from the dead into new resurrected life and not just a ghost?

Sir Norman Anderson, a law professor at Harvard at Princeton concluded after a lifetime of analysing the resurrection from a legal perspective, summed it up in one sentence: 'The empty tomb forms a veritable rock on which all rationalistic theories of the resurrection dash themselves in vain.'

Please note there won't be the regular 11.00 am service that morning.



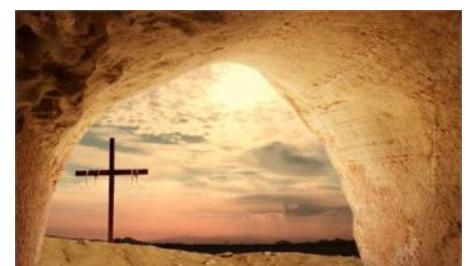
Good Friday

REVISION OF CHURCH ELECTORAL ROLL 2026

The revision of the Electoral Roll for The Parish of St. John's, Coulsdon, will take place between Wednesday 8th April and Wednesday 22nd April 2026 inclusive.

Forms of application for enrolment or amendment can be found on the large table by the inner door in Church and when completed should be placed in the marked box there no later than 22nd April 2026 after which no further changes can be made until after the Annual Parish Church Meeting on Sunday 10th May. ***Please complete a separate form for each person. It must be signed by the person applying. If your name is already on the Roll you do not need to complete a form.***

If you are aged 16 or over and have been baptised you are entitled to be on the Roll if you live in the parish or, if you don't live in the parish, but you have regularly attended services at St John's for a period of at least 6 months.

The Electoral Roll is a record of the membership of the church and only those who are on the Electoral Roll will be entitled to vote at the Annual Parish Church Meeting.

Completed forms must be returned by 22nd April.

STORYTELLING

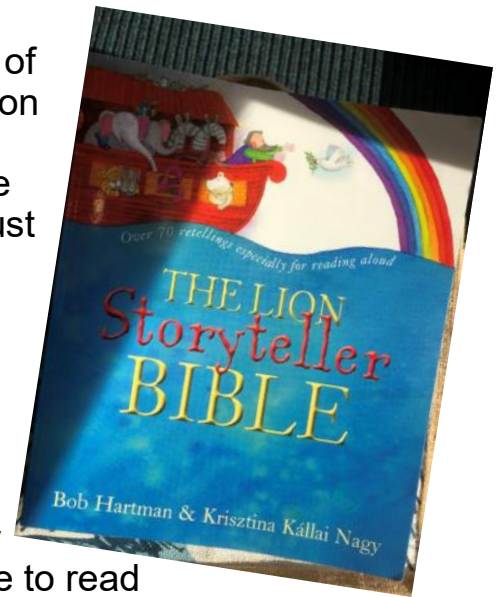


There's something so special about storytime isn't there? Do you remember being read to when you were little? Those of you who were pre schoolers from the '50s to the very early '80s will surely recall "Are you sitting comfortably? Then I'll begin" Yes, it was Listen with Mother, broadcast on the BBC radio (Home Service) every weekday at 1.45pm. If you hanker after some nostalgia, or you are too young to remember, old broadcasts can still be found on YouTube.

Other lovely storytimes stick in my head. In the early '60s, at school when it was 'wet play', too rainy to go out into the playground after lunch, the whole class would gather around, put their heads down on their desks, while the then called 'dinner lady' opened a book and began to read, and suddenly the room would go quiet. For a little while everyone was transported somewhere else through adventures, fairy tales, and characters that stayed in our minds long after the bell rang. I remember well the comforting presence of Mrs Casey, clad in her blue overall, opening the book 'The Wishing Chair' by Enid Blyton and beginning to read.

Moments like these were simple but unforgettable parts of school life. Listening carefully, and letting your imagination run wild was a daily joy for many children across the UK. For some, it may have been the only time someone read to them. It was not about screens or technology, just a lovely story with someone who knew how to bring it to life. Those quiet classroom moments created memories that we still smile about today.

I grew up in Mitcham, and other special times for me were visits with my mum and brother to the local children's library. I must have been about seven when I chose the book 'The Silver Sword' by Ian Serrailier. My mum told me it was too old for me and I wouldn't be able to read it by myself, but I was insistent that I wanted it. I still remember its dark blue cover with silver writing. Cosy times followed. Cuddled up on the bed with my mum and brother and captivated by the story.



Fast forward to my own children's childhood. Computer games were taking off but books still formed an important part of our lives. Both my boys were and still are avid readers. Favourites were the Goosebumps series and Harry Potter, of course. My youngest loved to read his reading book but only whilst he was completely upside down on the sofa! Now we have the next generation and once more I'm cuddled up on the bed but this time with the three grandchildren close by me, enthralled by the latest tales, imploring me "just one more story Nanny, before we get under the covers and you turn the light out"! The current favourite of my middle one is 'Peck, peck, peck!' the story of a baby woodpecker, written in rhyme.

Stories have always been one of our most powerful ways to understand the world. Long before the internet and AI, people learned through sharing stories, around fires, in homes, and in churches. Stories could travel easily from person to person. In Jesus' time, a listener who heard a parable in a crowd could later recount it to friends, family and neighbours.

A good story draws listeners in, encourages them to see the world a different way, and challenges them to act. The stories Jesus told and the story of His life continue to inspire us and fill us with love, compassion and hope.



At my last church I was blessed to be part of an 'Open the Book' team. We were a group of trained storytellers going into schools and telling and acting out stories from the Bible to children and staff in whole school assemblies, with the children joining in interactively. The impact of this was evident in parents' comments about the stories children took home and told their parents. And so history repeats itself.

As I watch at 'Little Ones' the children sitting together with their grown ups listening to the simple stories of Jesus, I am struck once again by the power of these words to impact, heal and transform lives. It doesn't matter who or how or where these stories are being told, it just matters that they are. So if and when you get the opportunity, continue to spread the Word! Amen. *Wendy J.*

DISARM

Ephesians 4:29. *'Let no corrupting talk come out of your mouths but only such as is good for building up, as fits the occasion, that it may give grace to those who hear.'*

I was thinking last month about what to give up for Lent. I thought of the usual things, like no chocolate. Then I read one good thing to give up was using your tongue as a weapon. That was a new one to me. Then I thought about it.

As Christians we are meant to speak from Love. There are some negative statements which have come up in the English language recently, which could be seen as using the tongue as a weapon. For example, I really dislike it when somebody says *'they are a waste of space'* or *'they are toast'*. Who thought up those nasty expressions which have spread so quickly?

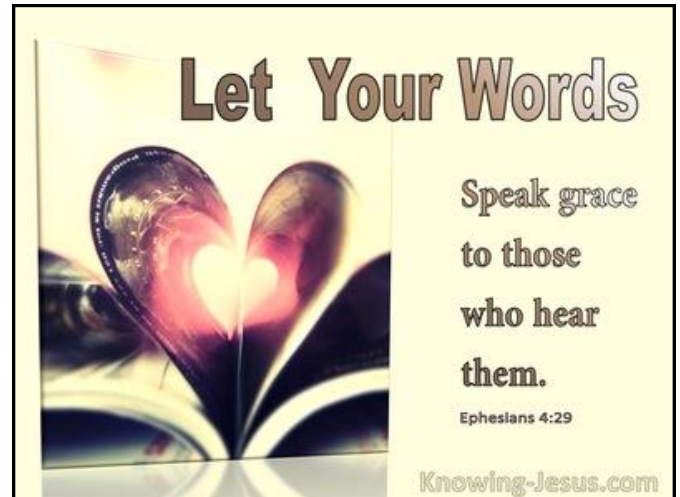
Speech used as a weapon can be seen in our present world situation; it's as insidious as a snake.

If we can use words as a weapon, then we can use words to disarm. Can you imagine when somebody verbally attacks you, you reply 'peace be with you'. Think of their hesitation that there is no counter-attack. There is no war if no-one is there! If someone verbally attacks you, imagine they are speaking to themselves. It is they who have the problem, not you. Keep your peace.

Let us pray for disarmament, not just in our speech but in the world. Basically you could say that speech has become out of hand. When words are wrong, that is when wars begin. If we pray for peace our prayers will be heard. As Jesus said (Matthew 17: 20) *'If you have Faith the size of a mustard seed, you will say to this mountain 'move from here to there' and it will move. Nothing will be impossible for you'*.

In other words, our Faith and prayers can lead to disarmament.

We have held our usual two charity days, a summer garden party and our Christmas Open House . Apart from raising money these events provide a wonderful opportunity for people to gather, socialise and eat and chat together. They have become an important community event which brings in people from the local area and beyond.



We lost a very dear friend, Jean Ford, in November (unbelievably on the day of our Christmas Open House). Jean had hoped to go with the team on our first trip to Kasese, but unfortunately due to health problems she was unable to come with us. Chris, her husband, did come with us, and both have been stalwart supporters of our charity since. Jean always helped me set up the tombola and ran it, and her delicious cakes were famous!!

We were quite overwhelmed when Chris told us that Jean wanted any money collected at her Thanksgiving Service to go to The Porridge Pot. Can you believe that £900 was collected . An amazing amount!! ly giving (via Emanuel International). This way Alphonse can budget when buying 'the porridge' (cassava) and we can continue to help provide a daily bowl of porridge for the children.

CATCHING UP WITH TONY

Since coming to Faith I frequently think about God's plan for me and my life, and marvel at how He manages to catch us out at every turn.

Last night – 18th March – as I walked in to church for Alpha I gave a silent thanks for whoever it was who had cut all the grass that morning, as it was 'on my list'. Entering church and beginning to welcome our guests, our dear Wendy very gently asked if I could write something for this month's magazine – when frankly I had been short of ideas. During the (as usual) lovely meal I learned that one of our friends had been 'sawn in half' by the magician she'd hired to make her wedding reception go with a bang, and how certain ladies' nails can 'drop off'. Amazing what you can learn at Alpha!

Then it was on to Week 9 of the course, and after the video we got ready to discuss the topic "*Why and How Should I Tell Others*". That's when our Lord stepped in as I tripped over a chair, gashed my leg, and poured my life blood on to the carpet. Rescued by my church family friends Alison, Mairwen, and Charlotte, Alison drove me to

East Surrey Hospital and waited with me in A&E for several hours until I was called for treatment at well past midnight. It was on the way home by taxi that I realized that I had been offered the chance to talk about Alpha to a stranger – the A&E nurse who cleaned me up and dressed the wound.



It was a very long wait but worth it in the end, so I give thanks for not only the opportunity, but the skill of the male nurse, the care and friendship of friends, and especially Alison who steadfastly refused to leave me on my own – even when the information board was telling us that waiting time could be up to 7 Hours! Now after quite a good night's sleep I am doing as told – resting – and writing something for Wendy.

Just like this example, Rev Jono uses his life experiences to inspire us all through his excellent sermons; full of word pictures and colour we felt his pain last Sunday as he described how after a birthday treat to the seaside, one of his son's friends, projectile vomited all over the back of his people carrier. I've been lucky in not suffering from car sickness, but as children my sister did, and I have had dogs throwing up – such fun!!

His sermon that day went on to explain the culture in the Middle East of inviting



guests into your home for a meal, and linked it to the story in Luke 19: 1-10 where Jesus invited himself into the home of Zacchaeus the chief tax collector. Jono worked for some time in Jordan, whilst I also spent time out there but in the Sultanate of Oman. I enjoyed many a good night in the homes of (mainly)

expats, but a couple of times with Sudanese colleagues, and once with a Palestinian family (although never seeing the ladies). Their generosity can be overdone however, and on this occasion I remember when having eaten a pretty full meal the host said that I really must have some more and plopped a whole roast leg of lamb on my plate. Offense can be given by refusing so I ate a few morsels before saying that I was now too tired to eat more. This apparently is perfectly acceptable, so I was able to leave with my head held high, whilst looking forward to a long walk on the beach and a swim to shake the meal down.

Real hunger must be a terrible thing, and we're seeing it almost every night on our TV screens as pictures of so many war zones are brought in to our living rooms. What must it be like to spend your days looking out for things/people who might kill you, whilst searching for food. I thought of this just the other day as I was getting out of my car at the bowls club and watched a Red Kite circling overhead. It came down really low, so it was a beautiful sight, but on that day there weren't any recently deceased bowlers lying on the grass; so he flew on.

Best wishes to you all and thank you St John's for all the good things – and Good News – that comes with each passing day. **Tony**

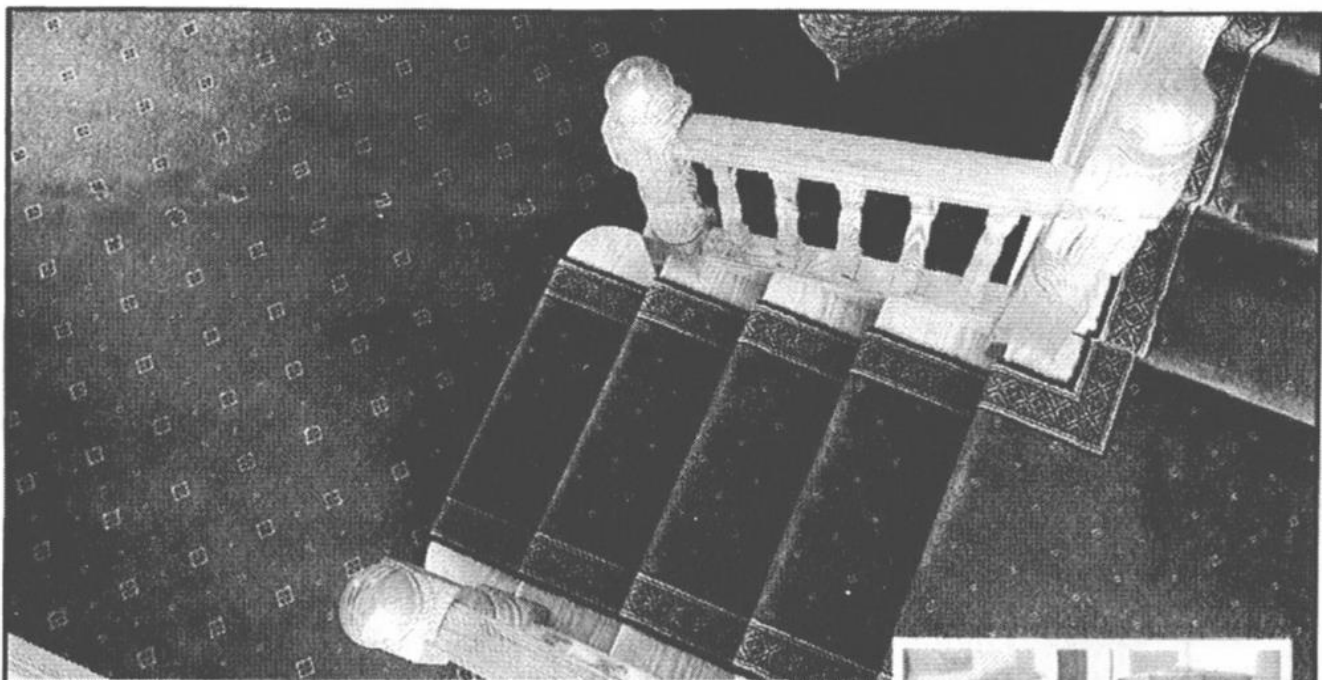
