Dear Friends

The Day of Pentecost, which we celebrated on 23rd May, marked the beginning of the mission of the church – Christ's body here on earth. The disciples had been in a state of 'semi-lockdown' since the resurrection, but now they burst out into the open with a message of Good News and many people began to follow Jesus.

We've been in a state of lockdown, on and off, for over a year and now we are beginning to come out and start living openly again. Some have embraced the isolation as a period of hibernation, some have found it more of an imprisonment, but for all of us it may take some time to readjust to living socially again.

I'm looking forward to the church moving from maintenance to mission mode once again. We already have a queue of families enquiring about baptism, and that gives us a wonderful opportunity to share our faith with them. Weddings will start again, and the opportunity to welcome people to the church who may not otherwise ever come.

To help us set mission priorities for the next year or so we will be holding our **Mission Action Planning Morning** on **Saturday 26th June**, from 10.am in the church. It will be an opportunity to review our activities in the light of the Five Marks of Mission, and identify areas where we need to develop. We'll consider our welcome and outreach, our worship and pattern of services, our work with different ages – infants to seniors, our pastoral care, our engagement with issues of peace and justice, and our care for creation. To prepare for that, we have produced a leaflet which should be included with this magazine. I'd be very grateful if you could give the questions some thought and return the leaflet to me or to the church before 26th June.



THE WORLD DAY OF PRAYER WHEN MARCH BECOMES JUNE


The World Day of Prayer is celebrated on the first Friday in March, but this year it had to be postponed.

Shed Paint and Problems!



You'd think painting a shed would be simple. Choose a greenish colour, buy paint, paint. Not so simple! The sample colours arrived and the 'light green' one look a bit acid. The darker one looked too much like the ground, and one that was supposed to be blue looked white. So we've gone with shades of grey.

Having ordered the paint, it arrived and the rain just poured down and caused some problems. Apart from muddy ground everywhere, the shed door absorbed all the water, swelled and stuck fast - with the hens inside! Then we tried to pull really hard on the door knob and it came straight off.

How can something so simple as sloshing on some paint end up being so drawn out and complicated. It's now fixed. The internal door to the hen coop has a simple push mechanism—should I ever need to open it from inside via the hen's tunnel! All that's needed now, apart from dry days to paint, is a latch for the window.



The hens would say though that the best bit of all this is that the three leaky tarpaulins that used to cover the roof to their run are gone. It was cold, wet, and miserable for them. Now they have a solid roof that lets through the sunshine. You can see them here enjoying themselves preening on their new perches.

And preening they must because these Rescue hens have some lovely new growth which is especially their wings. Their higher than ours at warm there.

It’s surprising that Jesus uses a hen’s warmth and downy wings to describe the power of his protection. His heart longs to extend his protection to everyone. When Jesus speaks of protection it isn’t only about powerful intervention, it is also about the gentle and comforting protection of God.

When Jesus spoke about the hen he was conveying the immensity of God’s love through the behaviour of one of his smallest and most timid creatures. And Rescue hens are just that, small and gentle, yet bold and fearless too.

A hen’s loyalty knows no bounds and she’ll follow you all round the garden. Hens are enablers in helping us to see God’s hand on us even in the midst of everyday pain and problems. The closeness of chicks to their mother, protected under the covering of her wings, expresses the nearness of Christ to us now, assuring us of his gentle protection, his powerful strength, the loyalty of Christ, not forgetting the warmth of his love - it is 40°C warmth under those soft downy wings.

Sadly we have since heard that John passed away peacefully at the beginning of May.

Ros, one of their daughters, has very kindly given us an insight into their very

tive years in Old Coulsdon.

Mum and Dad moved into Old Coulsdon in 1957. They bought 64 Caterham Drive where myself, Ros, and sister, Juliet, were born, before moving up to Court Avenue where they have been for 54 years. My brother David was born in Court Avenue in 1967.

All 3 of us were christened, within months of our birth, in St John's. We all went to school at Coulsdon C of E School, known to us as 'Bradmore Green'. Later in Dad's life he took on the role of a governor of this school and went on to be the Chair of Governors.

Dad worked in Hackbridge and Mitcham for Philips most of his life finishing his career with a few years in Hong Kong around the mid-eighties. Mum was a stay-at-home mum who ran the babysitting circle, took us to Pram Service and took on many roles at the church. She has been a member of

MU over 60 years now. Mum was always involved in any catering the church needed for various events when we were young and later responsible for the teas, coffee and squash served after church services. She was a sidesperson and later a churchwarden. Both Mum and Dad attended various house groups and were generally involved in anything to do with church! Both of

them read and Mum was on the Prayer Link for several years.

When we were growing up Mum took in foreign students to supplement her housekeeping money. During this time we had lots of very British food dished up! I fondly remember steak and kidney pudding!

Dad played tennis in several locations but for many years at the tennis courts

on the golf course by the old squash club. He played with his close friend Arthur whom he had known for over 70 years. He also played squash until he was 80! In his later years Dad took up painting and joined the art club which meets in the guide hut, and for several years was very prolific with his artwork.

Mum had various jobs while we were growing up. She worked at Coulsdon Court Squash Club, a wine bar in South Croydon as a cook and then in Purley selling holidays to Spain. She also did 'Meals on Wheels' around Old Coulsdon for a time.

When the 3 of us kids were involved in the Downland Joint Unit (a group of Ranger Guides and Scouts), who met at the guide hut/scout hut and the Tudor Rose(!), Mum and Dad came along as responsible adults on the annual foreign holiday travelling on the coach with us all and camping in very basic conditions!

As many of you know Mum has Alzheimer's and Dad had advanced Parkinson's with dementia. Rob and I have been caring for them at Court Avenue until very recently. As a family we made the difficult decision to continue their care in a lovely residential home in Poole very near their son, David, and his family.

Rob and I will return home to Nerja, Spain. We'll be back regularly to see Mum and our 3 children who live locally. We have 2 grandchildren on the

way in the UK. Our other daughter lives in UAE—we look forward to going over there as soon as travel allows. Juliet continues to live in Coulsdon for now (she has dreams and aspirations to go further afield!) and she will be visiting Mum regularly.

MOTHERS' UNION - Our impact

As a Christian mission charity within the Church of England with over 4 million members in 83 countries worldwide, there are a wide variety of projects encouraging, supporting and strengthening family life which, in turn, have a profound impact both for individuals and the communities in which they live.



This month I am introducing you to another of the amazing projects that MU members are involved in because of their faith in Jesus and the desire to bring His life, light, love and hope into the lives of others.

RWANDA - Sewing machines for disadvantaged women

Mothers' Union members in Rwanda have been responding to local needs with health awareness, Savings and Credit groups, peace and reconciliation, support for widows, and vocational skills training.

A particular project, which has helped women in Rwanda to support their fam-

ilies, was boosted by members in Ringmer, Sussex at a MU coffee morning. Two members from the Ringmer group visited the Diocese of Cyangugu in early 2019 and came across a tailoring project which Berthe, the Diocesan Bishop's wife had started.

Berthe realised that there were many young single mothers abandoned by their families. These women barely had enough to feed their children, earning a few francs by weeding and digging for a neighbour, and most mothers were going hungry in order to feed their children. She decided to teach these young women tailoring in order to give them skills to earn more money.

The project only had a few sewing machines for the whole group to use and needed more to help more women. The women then sold what they had produced thereby earning more money and giving them the dignity of being able to feed their family.

The MU members from Ringmer identified the need to provide more sewing equipment and education in tailoring. The treadle sewing machines cost £90 and were to be sourced locally, both to help the local economy as well as reducing shipping costs. Ringmer MU decided to hold a coffee morning to raise funds. They advertised widely and immediately people started to donate, even giving enough to buy a whole machine, and the final sum was £2,000 (2 million francs in Rwandan currency), far more than the group had dared to hope!



The money was duly handed over to Berthe and Esther (in cash) - in a brown paper bag! What an impact this will have made! Mothers Union does indeed change lives and communities. Please join us in

praying for this project and the other life changing work in Rwanda.

Having moaned - I'd like to say a big thank you to Abe Williams for his help in trimming the Box hedges – that's a big job with a small electric hedge trimmer – but he's got a big petrol one – so thanks Abe.

A couple of weeks ago Angela G and I met, to use up some of her stock of 'Roundup' weed killer, in the hope of getting rid of the weeds in the brick pathway ...

..but after 10 days or so they looked as if we'd put down fertiliser instead. So yesterday I spent some time with the jet washer which cleared a lot; but unfortunately I ran out of hosepipe, so couldn't complete the job. I'll have to see if I can locate another 10 or 20 metres somewhere so that this very messy



job can be done before the Bereavement Group arrives. The last time we met I made a bit of a mess of Gill Thaxter's belongings – sorry Gill - so it really is a job that needs doing when there is no-one around.

Anyway – so far so good

As I've said many times before there is so much history here – I wonder what could be revealed if we got the Time Team in with their 'geophys' machine to show what was under the surface.



During lockdown readers will be aware that the Old Church has

seen very little use, but as restrictions begin to be relaxed we will – I am sure – be back in there soon; so a check of the lights by Rev Paul found that a number of the flood and spot lights had failed. Our electrical contractors attended yesterday (12th May) with a view to replacing them all with dimmable LEDs. We've done a similar exercise in the main church, since which time none of those chandelier bulbs have failed – whereas before they were always going, and with call-outs at £90 a time they were a luxury we could not afford. Later – just had the quote in - £7,878.00. I'm thinking that our hardworking Parish Treasurer might have a seizure when she sees this, so perhaps a rethink will be required!

Back to more practical matters - we have all been looking forward to Pentecost on Sunday 23rd May. So our friends in the Bereavement Group organised a churchyard working party for Saturday and despite the weather threatening us with all sorts (see *this poor tree in Grange Park*), we had a very successful morning.



The group worked extraordinarily hard to produce enough garden rubbish to fill all the bags (below) not covered by the blue tarpaulin.

These will all be cleared by our grounds contractors over the next few days; so a massive big St John's "Thank you" to Patricia, Angela E, Sylvia and Graham, Vivien, Hazel, and of course our new Churchwarden Gill for a job well done.



In closing, most of our readers will have heard how Pentecost in the Garden went, to say nothing of the lovely drinks and cake afterwards; so thank you Paul, Nicy, Sue and our singers – and of course the weather gods who gave us sunshine and a robin who sang his heart out during the service – a lovely day that will be remembered by us all.


A LOVELY SURPRISE!

Young people, drugs and alcohol – what every churchgoing parent and care-giver needs to know

Booking is now open for this webinar presented by Southwark Diocese in partnership with the local drugs awareness charity the Daniel Spargo Mabbs Foundation. It is about the levels of young people's exposure to drugs and alcohol; what children and adults in Christian families (or any families) need to know about the risks; the brain development and other factors that affect young people's decisions; how to have effective conversations with your child and practical suggestions for what you can do to support them to stay safe. 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
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
