Jono writes...

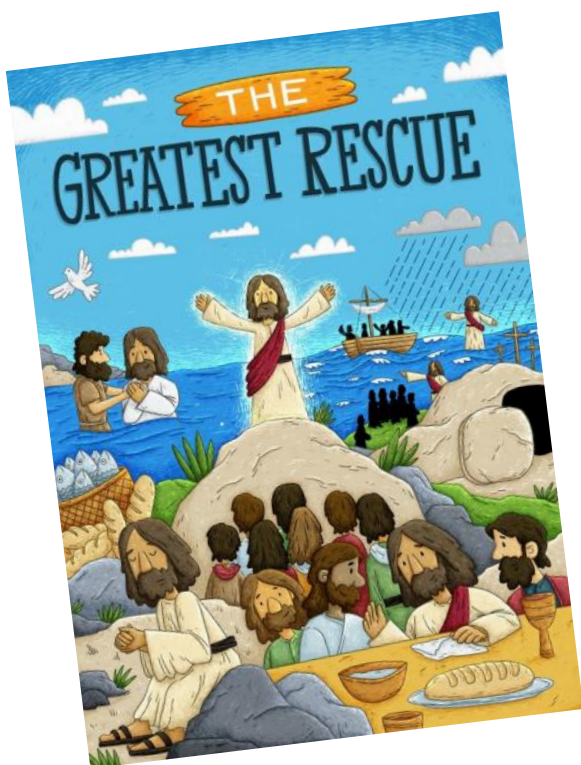


March

Lent is like a time for training in spiritual discipline. Of putting ourselves in a place of needing God, so that we are more ready to withstand temptations the rest of the time. Fasting is such a gift, but it's one I struggle with.

One Lent I fasted from caffeine, which was a killer. I was so grumpy and tired. I know lots of people who have fasted from caffeine and then they stop having it from then on as they feel such freedom. I went straight back on it.



And yet looking back, I've seen the power of God at work in my life during times of fasting. I'd love to invite you to fast in whatever way you feel led by God.

This Lent our home groups are going through a great booklet by Abby Guinness called 'At the Cross'. Our families are going through a Lent devotional called 'The Greatest Rescue'. I'd love to encourage you to join in one of them.



Our vision at St John's is to help people meet Jesus. We want everyone in our area to have the opportunity to hear about the transforming love of Jesus Christ.

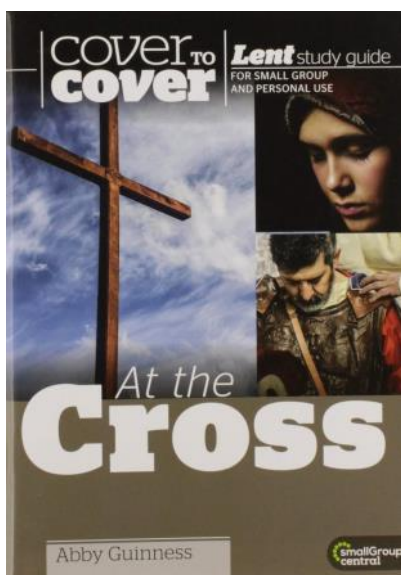

ASH WEDNESDAY – 5 March

... is the first day of Lent, when there'll be a Communion Service with Ashing at 7.00 p.m. in the Old Church. As always, everyone will be very welcome to come and receive communion or a blessing as they wish. During the service there will also be an opportunity to receive the sign of the cross with ashes on the forehead. Historically, ashes signified purification and sorrow for sins.

Palm crosses from the previous Palm Sunday service are burnt to produce ashes for this service. The ash cross on the forehead is an outward sign of our sorrow and repentance for our sins – a very suitable way to start Lent.

'YOU JUST HAVE TO SHARE IT'

As Jono began his sermon on 2 February, I was taken straight back to the same time five years ago. It was the weeks immediately before Covid struck and turned all our lives upside down.

January 2020, and we had booked a retreat week at Lee Abbey in the wild and beautiful Valley of the Rocks in Devon. The week was billed as 'Bread Week'. We would learn the art of bread making in all its forms and reflect on its spiritual connec-



tions. Although it was a retreat week, we would also be serving the community by baking the bread and pastries for all the guests staying that week. Others would be there to gain some much needed quiet time, to enjoy the scenery, to walk the coast path and, along with us, to partake in worship and prayer and share meals together.

So early on a cold January morning, we set off on our adventure. It was a long



drive over to North Devon, but our tiredness lifted as we entered the Valley of the

Rocks and saw the wild and craggy coastline; seabirds wheeling and crying overhead and the sound of the waves crashing far below on the shore.



Our days were full as we mixed and kneaded, shaped and baked. We learnt patience as we waited on both the bread to rise, and on God, to see if He might speak to us. Our friendships deepened as we used the dough

rising time to share stories about ourselves and our relationship with Jesus. We worshipped together, ate together and prayed together, rising early to get the day's baking ready before breakfast.

Our first task on that first morning was to get our sourdough starter underway. We learnt that from two basic ingredients, flour and water, we could create and watch this alchemy in action. All around us in the air is wild natural yeast, particularly prolific around green countryside areas and it is this that starts the process off.





Every day, alongside our kneading and baking and praying we nurtured and fed our starter, also called the 'mother' and contained in the Kilner jar we had brought with us. We laughed as we were encouraged to name our jar, as our starter became a living, growing entity. Names ranged from Fred to Thaddeus!

By day three, our starter was bubbling and fizzing with a life of its own. By day five it was desperate to escape the jar. It smelt gorgeous, of beer, hops, yoghurt and barley. An indescribable fragrance that made you keep wanting to open the jar and inhale it. There was no way it could be kept in, as daily it grew too big for the jar. We just had to share it by giving it away to other guests at the Abbey, to form new starters with new nurturers. And this is

what Jono was alluding to in his sermon. Once you have the joy of knowing Jesus, you just can't keep it to yourself, you just have to share it. It bubbles out of you, infusing and filling others, so they in turn grow in faith until it bubbles out of them and then they in turn have to share.

Our last day at the Abbey came and we set off with our starter safely wedged into a small cardboard box. We were on our way further down to Barnstaple, on to Plymouth and finally ending up in Cornwall. We wondered how on earth we would manage to keep our starter alive and fed on the journey and at our various B&B stops. We needn't have worried, because wherever we stayed our hosts wanted to hear the story of James (yes, we'd given our jar a name!). And this is the story of how our sourdough starter spread across the West Country, not only making beautiful golden sourdough loaves but also spreading the Word of the Lord as we explained to our hosts what we had been doing.

NEW ELECTORAL ROLL

This year we have to compile a new Electoral Roll so **everyone** who wishes to be on the Roll and is entitled to be so will need to complete an Application Form. If you are aged 16 or over and have been baptised you are entitled to be on the Roll if you live in the parish or, if you don't live in the parish, but you have regularly attended services at St John's for a period of at least 6 months.

The Electoral Roll is a record of the membership of the church and only those who are on the Electoral Roll will be entitled to vote at the Annual Parish Church Meeting which this year will be held on **18th May**.

Application Forms will be available in church from 18th March and there will be a box for completed forms at the back of the church. Please take an Application Form for other family members or friends who may want to be on the Roll. If you are unable to get to church to collect a form, please let the Parish Office know and we will deliver one to you. **Please complete one form for each person and the form must be signed by the person applying.**

Completed forms must be returned by 21st April.

CATCHING UP WITH TONY

To start my contribution to our magazine this month, I'd like to say a big 'thank you' to Elaine Gray for her inspirational, and joyful article last month about the re-opening of Notre Dame Cathedral (Notre-Dame de Paris). The fire that consumed it five years ago was an event that lodges in the memory as clearly as the death of Diana Princess of Wales, and the assassination of President John F Kennedy in 1963. How wonderful it has been to see the many millions of Euros raised for the restoration, and the God given skill and talents of so many specialist tradespeople to make it happen. I can't wait to visit it in person.



Contrast this to the two hour programme on TV marking the 80th anniversary of the liberation of the Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp. I've rarely been moved in the way that I was when listening to the testimonies of the very few remaining survivors. Even King Charles was seen wiping a tear from his eye. The event was put together with such reverence and dignity; those beautiful candles placed before the full size replica railway wagon reminded us all of what humans are capable of, and are still doing. A frightening glimpse into the future, or a poignant symbol of hope?

With all the associated questions and feelings bubbling up inside, it was such a joy to embark on St John's first Alpha course for a number of years. Rev Jono

has enthusiastically driven this thing forward, and we have a grand team of people helping. Trudy B, Jeff L, and I have joined Jono in leading the two groups; and a rota of lovely people attend in the background providing food, drinks, coffee/tea etc to say nothing of all the washing up. The new TV monitor is put to good use for the 30 minute videos, and these are followed by what in some instances are very challenging discussions. Guests have been split into two groups – one much younger (including four teen-agers) and the other of (shall we say) more mature participants. As I write we are five weeks in and are looking forward to an ‘away-day’ at Holy Trinity, Brompton with the course itself continuing until the tail end of March. Please pray for us all, not just for the course but for all those in our congregation who may be working towards confirmation.

The weather of course remains pretty horrible so work in the churchyard has been curtailed, although we do have to thank Steve and Diane who have continued to keep it looking tidy – and especially to Steve who has worked tirelessly to continue the work started by Gill to clear the brambles and ivy off the north-east boundary, and the back fences of houses in Dean’s Walk. Here we have the evidence of what they’ve been doing – which brings me on to a plea for assistance:-



There are about ten bags in all, and they’re not overly heavy, but are too full of ‘springy’ stuff to get in my car. Does anyone have a small pick-up truck, or a large estate car, who could help us take them to the dump? This would help the church (in that we wouldn’t have to pay contractors) and keep our neighbour in The Grange happy, as this pile is close to her family’s memorial stones. Thank you.

Having said all that I did nip up to the churchyard for a bit of a mow, and hearing

voices etc round the back of the church, walked round to see this:-



It was a huge tree, and I don't think I'd like it so close to my house, or the Vestry; so the work will give the householder a lot more light, and St John's gardening team, a much easier time of it next autumn, when the leaves (don't) come down! Oh and whilst the noise of the chainsaw somewhat disrupted that day's 11:00am service, the mowing and strimming later in the day went well.

In closing, the news from the Middle East continues to be troubling, and it is with a heavy heart that I recall visiting Jordan years ago for work, and being treated to a day out, travelling from Amman, down The King's Highway to Petra – quite close to the border with Israel. How sad it is to read the daily reports of the awful war between that fine country and the Palestinians. When you think that this was the land of Jesus. There was no Gaza, other than a town of the same name; so as a fragile ceasefire stands we could pray a line from the 131st Psalm – **“Let Israel hope in the Lord from henceforth and forever.”**

‘... February’s **2,925 meals for 325 people** were 360 meals more than in January but the two months’ combined total of 5,490 meals was 20 per cent less than in 2024. Welcome as this

may be, it is too early of course to identify any trend and, sad to say, we do expect a busier spring as families already struggling to meet rising food prices are further hit by increases in energy and water costs and council tax demands from April.

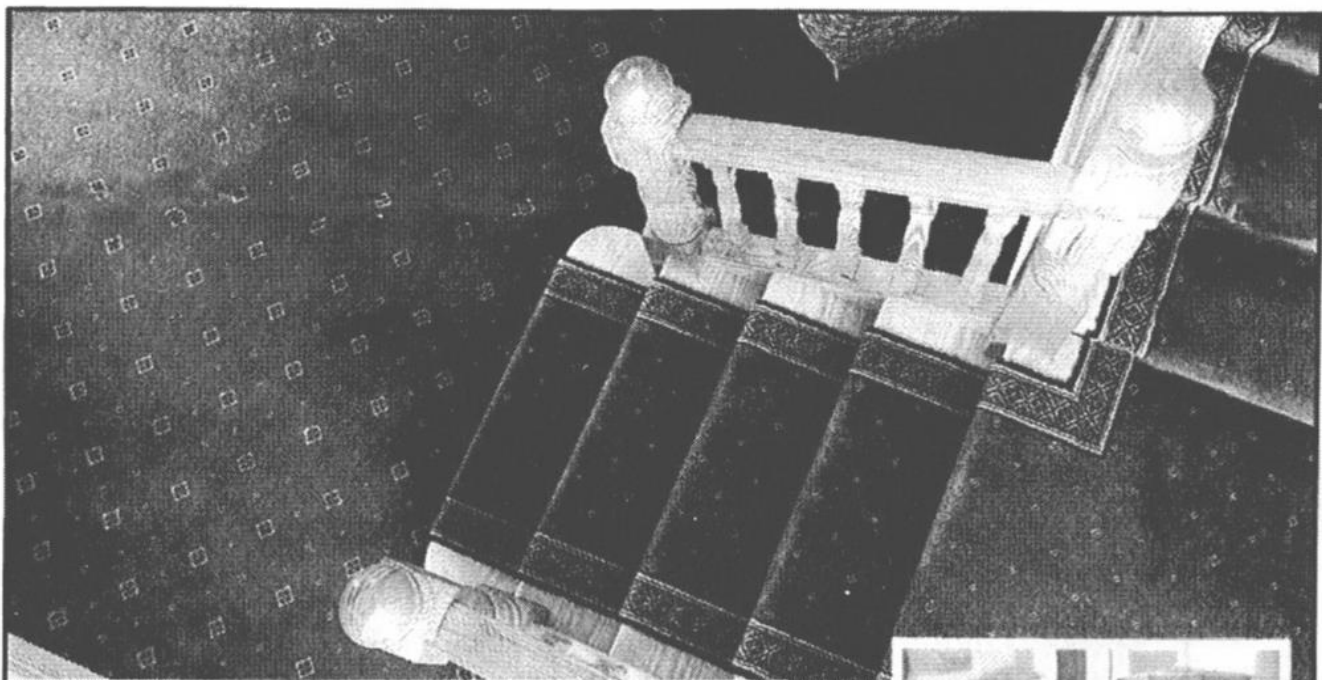
