Jono writes...



March

We're in Lent, a time of fasting. Why do we fast? We do it because Jesus told us to. He taught his followers to fast after he'd gone back to God the Father. The main reason is to **focus on God**. When we fast, we are able to put aside things that distract us from God, or that we rely on too much. When our tummy rumbles or we're tempted by that thing we've given up, we're able to pray we 'do not live on bread alone but on every word that comes from the mouth of God'. 'Lord, I'm hungry right now for food, but I'm more hungry for your work in my life. I need you more than the food I want right now' There's an **inward reordering** that goes on when we fast, and we're putting God back in his rightful place.

The Early church was known for fasting. One of the church fathers, called St Isaac the Syrian said,



'As healthy eyes naturally aspire to light, so the soul of the person observing a reasonable fast, naturally aspires to prayer. When you will fast then your mind will aspire and wish to converse with God. Our Lord [Jesus] was the leader and the first conqueror. He first delivered the victorious crown of our nature. Since then, whenever the devil sees that someone has this weapon, [referring to fasting] immediately he is afraid, immediately he imagines and remembers that defeat which he underwent by the Saviour in the desert: his power is destroyed and disappears.'

So we fast because Jesus told us to, there's an inward reordering, and there's somehow a power in our prayers when we do.

In your place of testing, could you try the spiritual discipline of fasting, something to help you focus your mind on God, and to release God's power into your life and situation?

This March we've got various events lined up. On March 1st we'll have Mojtaba Hosseini sharing his story of coming to faith in Iran, starting house churches



and being put in prison for it. If you miss it, **catch up on the podcast**, or check out his courageous and inspiring story on YouTube. Search: 'Mojtaba Hosseini HTB' or 'Eat and Amen Mojtaba Pray Iran'.

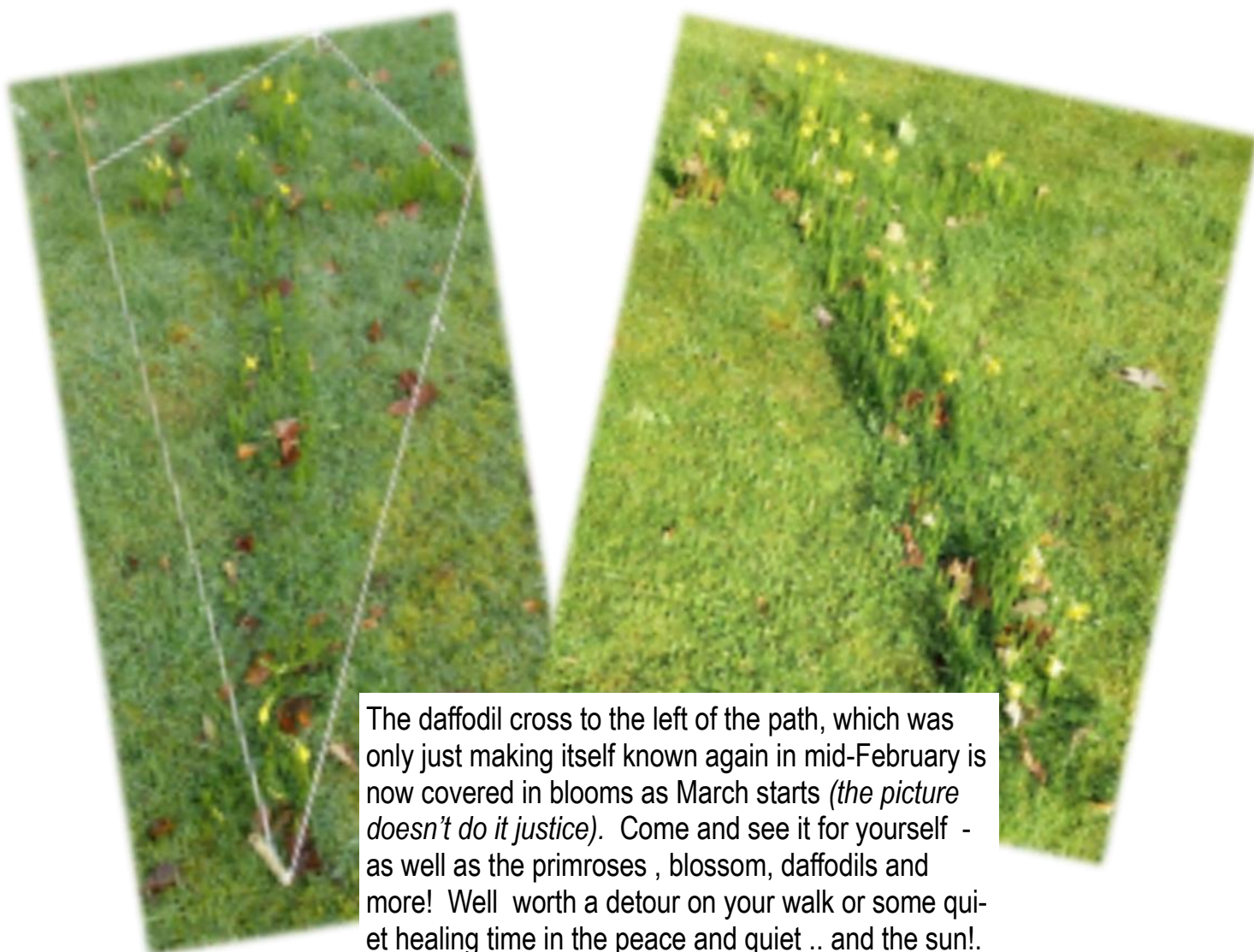

Every Sunday

9:15 am Parish Communion is a fairly traditional service. We sing familiar hymns, have a Bible talk, intercessions (prayers for the world, the parish, family and friends and ourselves) and the opportunity to receive communion or a blessing. There's time to get to know others and build friendships after the service over tea, coffee and biscuits.



10.45 am Our Contemporary Service with worship songs and a Bible talk and a chance to receive prayer. We have children's groups—from pre-school to year 7—every week during term. In the holidays the services are all in services. Come for coffee before the service or stay after. It's designed for all - whether you are new to the Christian faith or looking for a church, this is a service where you will find friendship and encouragement in your faith.

First & Third Sundays

8.00 am Holy Communion is a quiet reflective service using traditional language. There are no hymns, just a short talk. Good for those who enjoy the old format and for those with a busy day to get it off to a good start.

Every Thursday

11.00 am Holy Communion service in the old church, also uses the 1662 Prayer Book and includes a talk and prayers. It's ideal for those who appreciate times of quiet reverence. There are no hymns. You can receive communion or a blessing or neither—as you wish. There's tea, coffee, biscuits and good company to be enjoyed afterwards—and a homemade soup and roll lunch on the second Thursday of the month. If you can't make it on Sundays, this is the ideal solution (and with a later start).

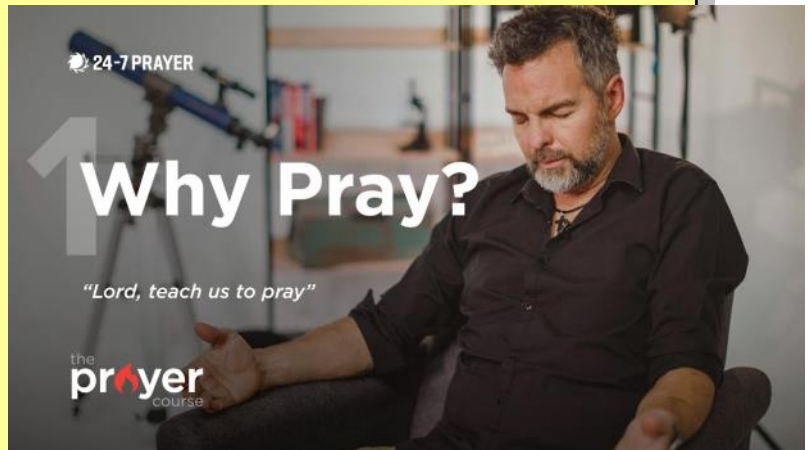

ARE YOU A GOOD NEIGHBOUR?

Have you ever woken up with a song going round and round in your head? You can sing all the words of all the verses without any conscious thought? Well, this morning (4.30am) it was 'When I needed a neighbour were you there....'. Today had dawned and was the deadline for writing something for the editor to consider for the parish magazine and I'd had absolutely no inspiration at all. However I took this earworm to be a 'God Wink' (thank you Elaine Gray, February magazine) and the words just flowed out of me. By the time I'd had a very early morning cup of tea I'd written this article.



I don't know about you, but I enjoy baking. I enjoy the look of what I make as well as its taste and above all I enjoy providing my baking for others. When my mum was alive she used to remind me of the grey pastry I used to make into jam tarts. Grey because I so enjoyed working and rolling the pastry that it discoloured from the sweat of my little hands and probably also from the dirt no doubt lodged under my fingernails from playing in the garden.

But no one refused my sweet offerings, taking them with pleasure and seeming to enjoy them with no adverse after effects.

Fast forward to the time of the pandemic. Leigh and I were strictly confined to the house and garden during this time because Leigh was in the government's extremely vulnerable category. We spent our time baking for our neighbours, leaving cakes and biscuits with little uplifting messages on their doorsteps. Our next door neighbour began a road WhatsApp group and most of the terraced houses in our closely packed road joined in. Thus began a time of sharing and bonding through small acts of love for each other. We left letters out and our neighbours posted them, we found bunches of freshly picked garden flowers outside our front door, one day a box of fruit was outside. We kept baking and sharing. Chocolate chip cookies for a family with four small children, exhausted after days confined to the house. Lemon drizzle for our elderly and lonely neighbour opposite, chocolate brownies for a supermarket worker. The list went on. The neighbours' children left us hand drawn cards. We began to add little prayers, the neighbours responded openly and with thanks. This love and care for each other continued long after Covid began to fade.



For me as always, the joy of baking is two-fold. The trialling of a mix of ingredients in a variety of combinations and the joy of seeing another's pleasure at eating

what I have prepared.

Our life in God is like this. It is a unique list of 'ingredients', giftings, prepared for each one of us by God. Many of the ingredients for each of us are the same, the standard basics with a collection of unique flavours and additional bespoke elements. Although having the right ingredients is essential, it is no guarantee of a light, well risen and tasty cake. It is the precise measurement, the way they are combined and the oven temperature that determines the end product. For example the lack of one teaspoon of something can make all the difference. Our baking, like our life in God, takes time and effort but nothing is wasted if we are open and ready to listen and learn.

So, it's incredible how a great cake can be baked with just a few ingredients, in the right combination. In Christ we have all we need to live a blessed and abundant life. But it takes time and maturity to learn how to use those ingredients effectively.

Prayer is our foundation so why not pray to the Lord and thank Him for providing all the ingredients we need to thrive and live a full and blessed life?

At the end the Archbishop said to the congregation 'Welcome to your new Bishop' and there was a huge burst of applause as Bishop Gerard stepped forward with arms outstretched, as if to embrace his flock. He had a look of true joy and happiness on his face.

Joy is part of being a Christian. Pray for joy in our lives and in the lives of others. With all the doom and gloom in multi-media, we listen (*as we have to be informed*) but then we can find joy in our lives each day. It could be the sight of a

garden full of snowdrops, or watching and marvelling at the Winter Olympics. How the athletes strive for physical perfection. We are able to see on TV the majesty of the snow-capped mountains of Cortina, Italy. The dark pines against the white snow. There is so much good and many beautiful things in the world. 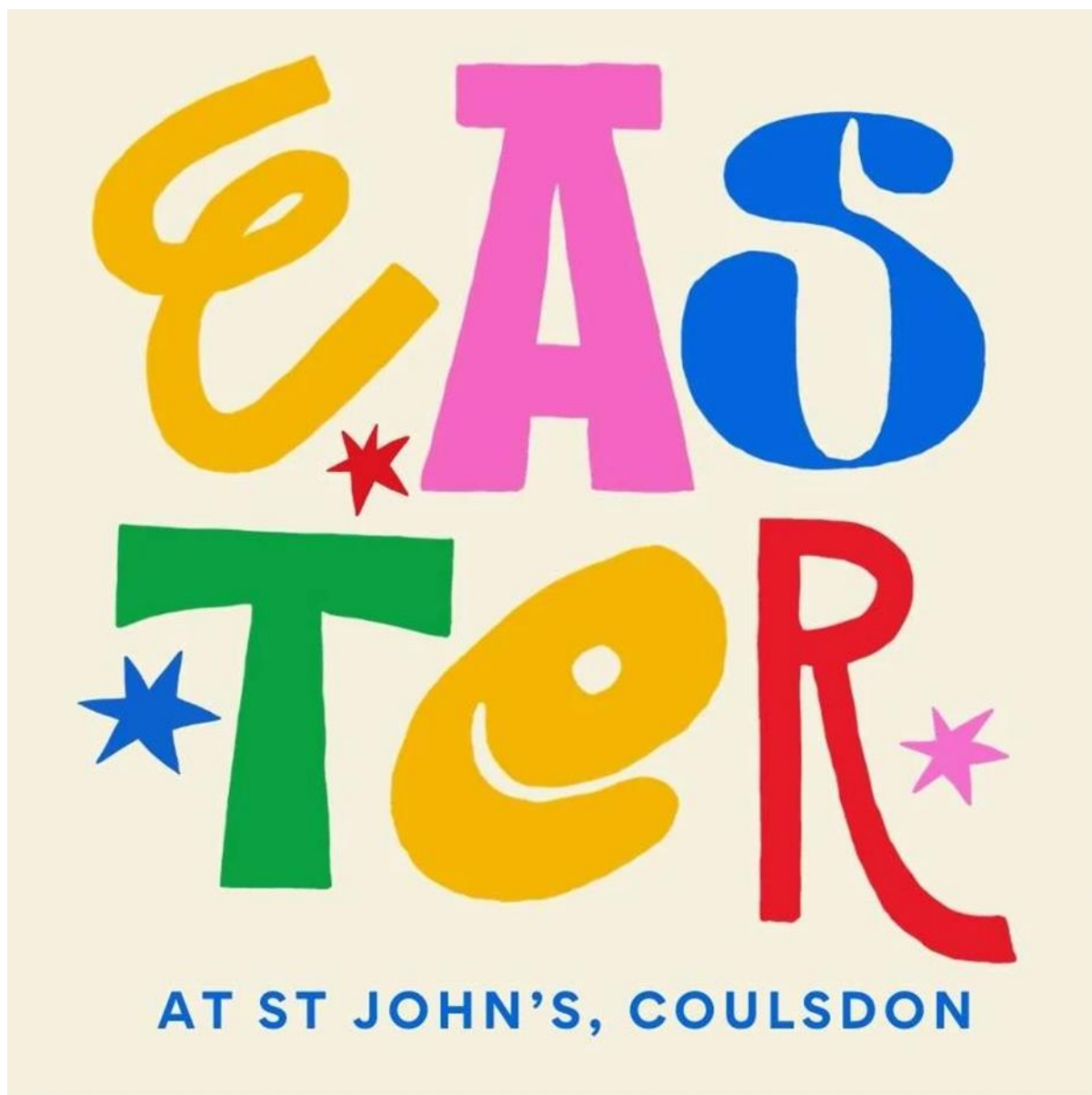

CATCHING UP WITH TONY

Well here we are again – is it just me or is the time flying by ever faster? The Winter Olympics are here once more, yet it doesn't seem more than five minutes ago that they were being held in Beijing. Fortunes come and go, as I well remember a lifetime ago that Shaun White was winning everything as a snowboarder – three Olympic gold medals – when this time he sadly crashed out of the half-pipe, competing at the grand old age of 35, just as a young Japanese rider - Kira Kimura - put down a massive switch backside 1980 spin to claim Gold in the Snowboarding Big Air competition, and three young men in the half pipe on skis scored 99 in the final. Some quite exceptional performances all round.

Whilst watching the weekend's sport on TV I was reminded of Christine's preaching last Sunday – 1st February – when she talked of stepping into the unknown. I could relate to that when years ago I was asked if I would be prepared to take a secondment from HSBC and work in the Middle East with the IMF for a year. Then watching the rugby Six Nations there was an ad where a young boy is saying "Don't think you can't do it, because you can"; and poor Lindsey Vonn the American downhiller thought she could at the age of 40, when having ruptured her ACL just a few days earlier decided to compete in the women's race, and thirteen seconds later was lying in the snow in agony. She went on to say "*We dream, we love, we jump – and sometimes we fall. Sometimes our hearts are broken; sometimes we don't achieve the dreams we know we could have, but that is also the beauty of life; we can try*". How true, and how wonderful that we are seeing transformations in church as new friends come to Christ, not just in the increased attendance, but in seeing the Holy Spirit come upon three of our people recently, which was a very moving and humbling experience for all concerned.

Talking of which, the Alpha course is going great, with a good mix of people who have bought in to it, wonderful food from around the world, and a host of helpers. Huge thanks to Alison for all she has done, to Ray and Mairwen, Charlotte, Jon and Jill, and of course to Rev Jono for driving things forward. In early February it was Rev Sue's final Deanery Synod as Area Dean as she leaves to take up positions at St Peter's in South Croydon as well as St Augustine's further back towards Purley. By chance one of our Alpha guests brought her Grandma along, a lovely lady who normally worships at the latter, so we might get some feedback (I'll keep you posted). I couldn't attend because of Alpha, but Enid did and said that it was a very joyous occasion, and that Sue left with a full heart and a future full of promise; we must all pray that she will be guided in her future ministry, and that these two churches will grow with the commitment and enthusiasm that Sue will bring to her work.



The season of Lent started on Wednesday and St John's celebrated with a good number of us attending the Service of Ashing led by Christine - with a special dis-

pensation as Rev Jono was on half-term holiday. A lovely service – even if the rain outside did its best to wash away the black crosses on our foreheads afterwards – well done Christine.



Finally a word about a visit to the church by Coulsdon Music and the Florian Ensemble quartet. What a lovely evening that was with the musicians performing 'in the round'. We enjoyed a varied programme including a piece where the cellist was using a Viol. I'd never heard of such a thing before, but it is bigger than a Viola and smaller than a cello, and is played vertically balanced on the musician's knee. Afterwards being the only church key holder there, I gave them a hand to move the chairs back ready for Sunday, and as the 'girls' ti-

died up the kitchen they pressed a large mug of hot spiced rum punch into my hand – it was delicious and warmed the cockles of my heart as they say – well it would have been rude to refuse!!

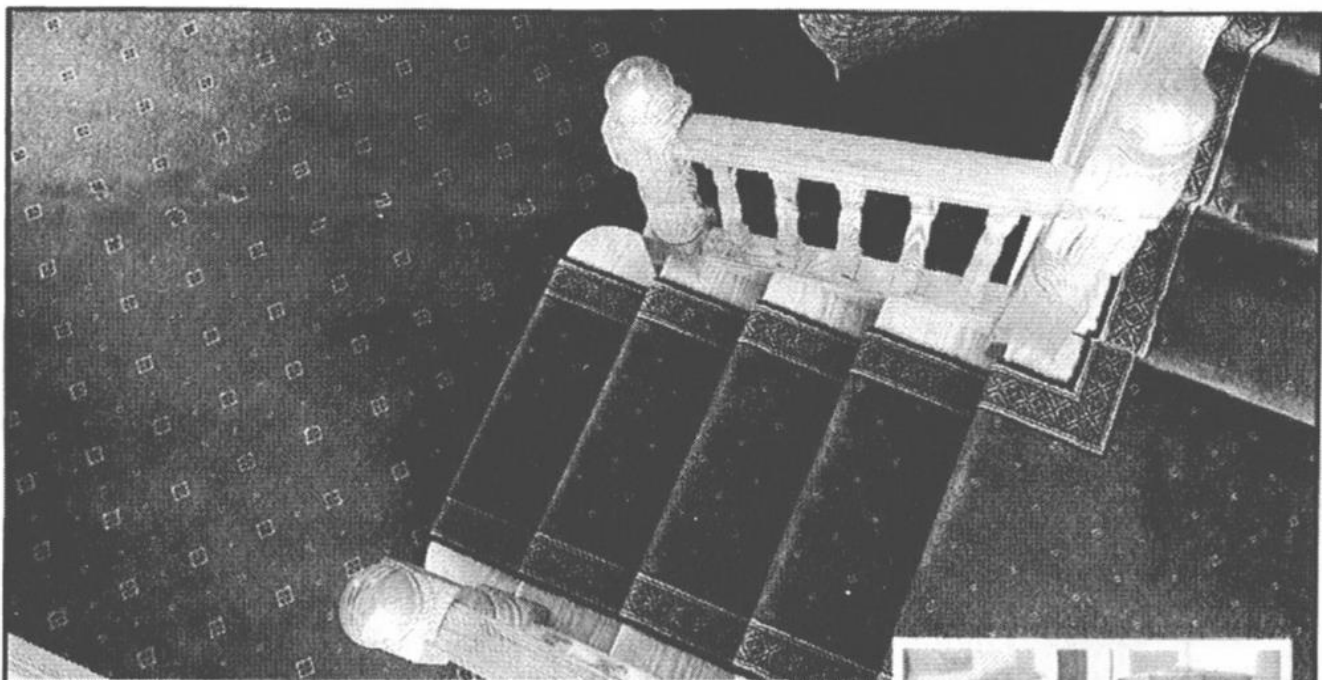
