

St John the Evangelist
Helping people meet Jesus



Rev'd Sue Thomas writes...

What a year! With visiting the Holy Land in March to see where Jesus lived out his ministry, both in Jerusalem and around the shores of Lake Galilee, it is with poignancy that I look back, remembering the warm welcome of the faces in the



retirement home for Palestine Christians. Our group guides, and the pilgrimage tour guide, were amazing and cared for us so well. But now their livelihoods are at risk because of war. Here is Bishop Christopher with the Mayor of Bethlehem





and Palestinian
Christians at this
Retirement Day
Centre. They
would appreciate
our prayers, I
know, and we
have had a message that
they are all safe.



Here is the owner and her sister who run this Retirement Centre. We travelled through the 'wall' to see them. Who would have thought that this is so unsafe for them now. Visiting the Holy Land was the most joyful and uplifting experience and has given me many insights to hand on.

Joy and suffering, pain and sorrow, are bound up together as we hear the devastation caused in the conflicts going on, both in Israel and Ukraine, and in other places not mentioned in the news. Manipur in India and Pakistan are both places of unrest where persecution of all faiths, and none is happening. So alongside prayer for those we hear about in the media, please do pray for those outside of the focus of media attention. It is especially right that we do this in November as this is the time for remembering. Remembrance Sunday is a time of giving thanks for those who put their lives first before others. This community event draws many of all faiths and none to remember together, in unity, that never again can these things happen. We hold on to that trust in hope and peace, and where peace breaks down, then we can stand up and speak out.

I sit on the UKFoRB Forum once a month and hear live issues of global persecution. Up to 90 civil institutions and NGOs attend. The Prime Minister's Special Envoy, Fiona Bruce MP, participates to take back to Parliament those situations to address them. Each situation is full of individual lives. In remembering conflicts, our hearts become moved when we focus on one individual. Mervyn Thomas CMG is UKFoRB Forum's Chair, and Founder President of CSW (Christian Solidarity Worldwide), and he did just that for us when he visited Croydon South Deanery Synod to tell us how to address daunting Justice issues. He read from Hebrews 11 and said it was our: 'Christian duty to speak out against persecution - otherwise we were complicit.' He suggests four things

we can do in this country: pray, protest, provide support (by connecting with and encouraging those under persecution), and proclaim: telling other people about the issue.

Being overburdened by the suffering seen in the media can be turned into an action to address this. Taking small steps, together, will change lives. What about writing to



someone suffering persecution - a real person in a real situation? You are not putting yourself in jeopardy—it is quite safe to write. Here is the link and be that person who makes a change in someone's life today.

REFLECTION:

The Jewish world into which Jesus was born was not one which championed gender justice. Indeed every morning a Jewish man thanked God in prayer for not making him a woman. However, Jesus radically challenged this culture through his words and actions. He openly conversed with women, met their needs and included them amongst his




followers and supporters. It was to a woman that he first revealed himself as the risen Christ. However history has unfolded since then, we look to Jesus as the perfect Champion for gender justice. His example is ours to follow, in attitude, action and advocacy.

FAITH IN ACTION

Campaigning against FGM - "Seek good, not evil, that you may live."

Female Genital Mutilation/Cutting (FGM/C) is defined by the World Health Organisation (WHO) as 'any procedure that injures the female genital organs for non-



medical reasons.' As well as causing severe pain and distress, it can lead to serious long-term health concerns and infections, mental-health problems and difficulties in childbirth, which can be dangerous or even fatal to both mother and child.

FGM is most common in Africa, the Middle East and Asia. Girls who remain 'uncut' are seen as unfit for marriage, due to misconceptions about them being promiscuous, unclean, bad luck, or less fertile. In some regions of Sudan, prevalence is as high as

96%. In Kenya, it is most widespread in the North-Eastern region and amongst the Kikuyu and Kalenjin ethnic groups. In Uganda, it is most common in the rural areas of the Diocese of Sebei. Progress is, however, being made in urban areas of Sebei, where campaigning has empowered girls in urban areas to pursue education without fear. Women are openly talking about the issue, educating their communities and leading the way to a brighter future.

Pray for: areas where damaging cultural norms mean that FGM is widely practised, that better education can mean an end to this cruel procedure.

MONTHLY PRAYER

As a worldwide movement, we embrace our mission to champion the cause of gender justice. May the God of righteousness equip us with all we need to play our part in creating a just and equal society. *Amen*



SMALL CHANGES

Last month's article by one of our Eco group offered some powerful reasons why we should care for our environment. Here are some suggestions about small changes we could make which would help.

Yes, you can guess what this is mainly about! One of the problems with buying eco-friendly items can be the price. I confess I failed to buy a tube of a well-advertised brand of eco-friendly toothpaste when I discovered it cost 4 times as much as a usual brand. (Dilemma



To resume. Another problem is that supermarkets rarely sell environmentally friendly products. Andrex, promoted by that delightful playful puppy, comes bottom of the list of ethical paper products. They animal test and use palm oil amongst other sins. At one time recycled kitchen and toilet rolls were readily available. Now they are hard to find, though I did see some in Waitrose.

Another way to save the trees we love, and which our planet needs so much, is to choose bamboo products. You can buy bamboo tooth-brushes, disposable cutlery, kitchen rolls of which each sheet can be washed and re-used up to 25 times, long-lasting socks with attractive designs and several other items. If you have ever had bamboo in your garden, you will know how fast it regrows after being cut.

We write fewer notes and letters now but one paper product in use



every day is the toilet roll. Just think how many trees may be being felled for that. No, I am not suggesting a return to using little squares of newspaper as we had to during the war, but we can save trees by choosing recycled or bamboo. These are readily avail-



able online, and the good news is that they need not involve a lot of extra expense. For less than £1 I bought a roll of bamboo paper which lasted three weeks!

If they were on sale one Sunday after church, with proceeds going to our Spire fund would anyone like to try one? Do let us know. **Eco Group**

Sue told us that we should indeed be 'ready for the party to begin'. Not in the

We can all have this party attitude now. Full of the fruit of the Spirit. Abundant life. There is plenty of room for all, with space at His table.

A few of us were talking after the service. We talked about the joy and excitement we feel on Saturday evenings and Sunday mornings knowing we are coming to church. The expectant joy of being in the presence of the Lord, of not knowing how He will speak to us, or what He will say, whether through great worship music, prayer or that day's message. KEEPING UP WITH TONY


