#### 'INTERREGNUM'

As September starts, here we are in an 'interregnum' because, as you know, Paul has retired and is moving to Kington, Herefordshire, . So, you may be thinking, "why isn't there an immediate replacement for Paul due now?". [I've already been asked several times locally 'Have you got a new vicar yet' or 'When's the new vicar coming?] However, in the Church of England, there is always a planned gap – a time for reflection – before a new appointment. The term for this is interregnum - which, in effect, means that there is vacancy between leaders—so we are now 'a parish in vacancy'. But we are in safe hands with Sue Thomas, our Assistant Priest, and Christine McCutchion, our Licensed (Lay) Reader continuing to lead us in our regular pattern of services, as well as two very active Churchwardens and a strong PCC (parish church council). The churchwardens write:

"As Paul and Nicy have now retired to Kington, we are entering an interregnum. Sue, Christine, Ralph, Gill and Wendy together with those working behind the scenes will endeavour to make sure everything runs smoothly. However, if there are concerns or worries within our Church Family, please speak to the Churchwardens, Gill or Ralph."

#### St John's begins to look forwards to new beginnings.

Saying goodbye to Paul on Sunday (23<sup>rd</sup> July) was moving, and everyone had happy tears knowing amazingly God-filled moments full of love and joy, and thanksgiving, for Paul's ministry among us.

We prayed the Aaronic blessing over Paul: 'The Lord Bless you and keep you; the Lord make his face to shine on you and be gracious to you; the Lord turn his face towards you and give you his peace.' (Numbers 6:24-27).

And for Nicy, we prayed from Ephesians: 'I pray that out of his glorious riches he may strengthen you with power through his Spirit, so that Christ may dwell in your heart.' (Ephesians 3:18-19).

We sent them from the 9.30 service with our blessing. Family Service followed and a Prayer Arch meant everyone could pray 'Bless you, Paul' as he walked up and down, so getting a double blessing as we played and sang 'Amazing Grace'. This photo encapsulates that happy moment, knowing God's love with Paul and with us. Here is Paul bending down to get through the little arms stretching up high as they could.

Someone said that 'the air was full of love, something very special, and it is something we shall hold for a very long time.' As we move forward with the Vacancy, Archdeacon Greg Prior, is overseeing the process with St John's. You may like to join myself, and Christine, for an hour of worship songs and open prayer. The Prayer Meeting will be in the



church, to pray for Greg, for all those involved in the planning and decision-making, and most importantly of all, to **pray for the new Incumbent-to-be**. There will be worship songs and open prayer, every month.



Life in St John's, and for me in the Diocese, is getting busier as September approaches. **Exciting things** are happening: a Latin Fiesta evening on 23<sup>rd</sup> September (do book with Roxy—details further on.).

You may remember Mervyn Thomas CMG who came to St John's in February. He returns to speak at an OPEN MEETING of Deanery Synod at St Mary's Church, Purley Oaks on 10<sup>th</sup> October, 7.30pm refreshments for 8pm start. I will Chair the meeting - so hope to get through the business at the beginning asap! Mervyn is an international, inspirational, and humble person who speaks out for those with no voice; for those who are persecuted, and he has spoken at the UN, European Parliament, Capitol Hill, Washington DC, and to our own Parliament.



Mervyn saw a need for justice and his book 'Standing Up and Speaking Out - 40 years of fighting injustice' is a good read, light-hearted yet serious as he personally takes a stand, putting himself at risk in dubious circumstances, particularly in Romania. He set up Christian Solidarity Worldwide and now chairs UKFoRB Forum, having taken over from Bishop Philip Mountstephen. The Forum is made up of

over 90 civil institutions and NGOs, groups of all faiths, and none. So do come to hear Mervyn speak, and to hear the positive work going on, things that don't get mention in the media!

And in the Diocese, you may like to come to the Bishop's Spirituality Day at Southwark Cathedral on Saturday, 14<sup>th</sup> October, 10-1.30 pm, £5.00. I shall be leading the day, along with two keynote speakers: Natalia-Nana Lester-Bush who will speak on the theme of 'rest'. I met her on a retreat for 'weary activists', and with my work on persecution, this was very helpful. So we look forward to her helping us to experience some 'rest'. Rev'd Canon Dr Andrew Bishop, priest-in-charge of Croydon Minster, will talk about 'sleep'. With some silence, musical nocturnes, and prayers for peace, this will lead into a time of healing and wholeness. Three bishops, along with the Spiritual Formation Group, will anoint people with oil should they wish it. Here is the link to book: https://rest-southwark-2023.eventbrite.co.uk

#### HARVEST FESTIVAL

There will be two opportunities to celebrate our Harvest Festival this year—on **Sunday 24 September** at the 11.15 a.m. **Family Service** and on **Sunday 1 October** at the 9.30 **Parish Communion.** So you can take your pick or why not come to both—they're sure to be very different! If you would like to bring something to church as a thank -offering, goods received will be distributed to 'Nightwatch' and 'Purley Food Hub'. :

**Nightwatch** volunteers are out every night in the centre of Croydon giving food and other help to homeless and other vulnerable peo-

ple. They help people at every level of homelessness, from the street homeless to those in hostels and bed and breakfast accommodation and vulnerable former homeless people who need continuing support if they are not to become homeless again. There are no paid staff, and no office premises. They need cans of soup (not packets) and also canned food, vegetables, meat and fish for

people who have basic cooking facilities, and cans of tinned fruit for people who have no facilities at all. Canned milk is also popular.

**Purley Food Hub** is an emergency food bank, set up 10 years ago and run by volunteers, that helps local people in crisis. They provide clients and their families with tinned and other non-perishable food and since the start of the Covid pandemic they've been delivering supplies direct to clients' homes. At



the time of writing they need: long life whole milk for children, jars of peanut butter and fish/meat paste, small packets/boxes of 40 tea bags, 500g packets of long grain rice, tins of ham and chicken, jellies, Angel Delight, tinned rice pudding, unisex deodorant, shampoo and bottles of washing up liquid



in the fun at this vibrant fundraising event whilst helping raise funds for the restoration of

St John's Spire. Enjoy a buffet of delicious food, cocktails and entertainment from great dancers. For those who fancy a go, there is a chance to learn some basic Salsa moves. Get ready for the Hora Loca (crazy time!) at the end, when everyone lets their hair down, balloons come down, garlands are handed out and you can show your newly-acquired skills on the dance floor dancing to Latin American music – all for a good cause!

#### **Surrey Churches Preservation Trust**

Most counties in England have an annual 'Ride & Stride', on the second Saturday in September, to raise money for church restoration and repair. The idea is that cyclists and walkers are given a list of participating churches in their area. They map out their own route to visit churches by bike or on foot, and then get friends to sponsor them for a fixed amount per church visited.

The money that is collected is divided into two. Half the monies go to the church of the cyclist/walkers' choice; the other half is retained by the Surrey Churches Preservation Trust for distribution to churches in need (that apply for a grant). In the twenty years that the Ride and Stride has been running in Surrey over £500,000 has been raised—St John's has had 2 grants from the Trust in the past.

This year the Ride and Stride is on **Saturday 10 September**. I will be taking part, trying to visit as many churches as possible on the day and I'm looking for sponsorship. Half the money raised will go towards the Spire Fund at St John's and the other half will go to the SCPT for distribution to other Surrey churches in need of restoration. John Alger has very kindly said he will accompany me. If you would like to sponsor us and help St John's, there is a sponsorship form on the Information Desk at the back of church. #### FAITH IN ACTION - Comfort and welcome in Norfolk

"Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by so doing some people have shown hospitality to angels without knowing it." Hebrews 13:2

Over the past few years, Norwich MU has been assisting with the resettlement of Syrian and Afghan refugees. These refugee families have often been in tempo-

Syrian and Afghan refugees. These refugee families have often been in temporary accommodation for some time, with a community of others in the same circumstances, before being offered a place to resettle. The idea of moving elsewhere naturally leads to trepidation. Ways needed to be found to make refugees feel as comfortable as possible.

People in diverse circumstances will have different needs. At the start of the resettlement project, Norwich MU joined together with other organisations to make a



difference - their contribution was to make up the beds for incoming refugees. They wanted refugee families to be well-cared for in a thoughtful way. Often when members went to make up the beds, the local mosque had already laid a prayer mat and members were instructed not to move that because it was already facing

the right direction. This attention to detail and respect makes all the difference. Pray for refugees coming into our country, that we would find ways of supporting and welcoming them.


Thank you so much for a very special party and for so many other things as

well! It was good to all be together in such a relaxed setting - I felt it 'consolidated' us as a group, preparing us for the changes ahead.



Before leaving the gardening though I must offer a tick and gold stars to Kevin for his work in the approach to the lychgate, and the triangle of grass outside Rose Cottage which once again looks loved and cared for; and also to Jeff, John, and the Scouts who put in an evening's hard graft clearing yet more grass and weeds from the less well cared for areas of the churchyard. It is much appreciated guys and girls, so thank you very much on behalf of all of us.

There was no gardening possible last Saturday (5<sup>th</sup> August) due to the appalling weather but we had a good session this morning, when I was joined by John Alger, and our recent friend Julie (I've been calling her Julia – but it's Julie). She continued weeding the brick circle, whilst John and I did a lot of mowing, and cutting back low lying but overgrown shrubs on the far side of the Garden – in doing so a grey marble grave was partially uncovered – but we'll need the big croppers to cut away some of the hard woody stems that cover it. A job for another day but we're beginning to get on top of it.

Whilst still metaphorically in the churchyard; some time ago a longstanding member of our congregation was telling me something of what went on in the laying down of the Garden of Remembrance, and the brick path in particular. Apparently the plans unknowingly incorporated the energy fields (or ley lines) said to pass through ancient religious sites, and that they can still be found today with the right equipment and belief. I'm a bit of a sceptic but our daughter isn't, and living only ten minutes or so from Stonehenge you may understand why! Then we walked round the brick path and as we arrived at the circle with the blessing for children, in the very centre of the slate circle, they came together again, although even more strongly. It seems unbelievable in this the C21st, but dowsing has been around for centuries, and from what I saw and experienced myself, is still alive and well.

Almost as an afterthought and not worked by 'magic', I should also mention that

the tower clock is no longer six minutes fast! It is spot on again. It necessitated a climb up the old wooden ladder in the ringing chamber to jiggle the buttons on the control box, whilst my assistant (Rev Paul on this occasion) checked from the path that the big golden hands on the clock outside, synchronised themselves with the digital clock inside. It would be fun to watch the change during the +/-hour in Spring and Autumn, but that takes place at 2:00am and would mean leaving a nice warm bed – so maybe not!

By the time this goes to print of course Rev Paul and Nicy will have gone, and we'll be coming to terms with another interregnum. Rev Sue, our Wardens, and Christine will be up to their ears, so we must all rally round and provide as much help and support as we can.

A final thought for this 'epistle' - I'd like to share something from the You Version bible app that starts off most of my days. It comes from Psalms 133:1 and reads "How good and pleasant it is when God's people live together in unity!"

I pray that during this busy time, we can all work together to provide support to those who need it, not just within the church community but to all those who cross our paths in life.


